

FRANK GALE BERRILL was the younger son of the late Major C. G. Berrill, "the Queen's" Regiment, and Mrs. Berrill of Pytchley Manor, Kettering. He was born at Streatham on December 31, 1896, and was at Suffield Park School, Cromer, before coming to Oundle in September 1910.

He entered Sidney, in which house he remained until he left in December 1915. He played for the XV in his last term.

Joining the Inns of Court O.T.C. he was trained in the Artillery Schools at Exeter and Larkhill, receiving his commission in the R.F.A. in October 1916.

A few weeks later he joined the 57th Battery in France, and served for a year near Lens, after which he was invalided home for the winter, suffering from gas-poisoning.

In June 1918, he joined the 87th Battery near Arras, and on September 28 he was mortally wounded near Bailleul, and died on the way to the Casualty Clearing Station. He was buried at Pernes.

His Brigade Commander spoke very highly of his keenness and extraordinary conscientiousness in all his work, and says he had commended him on several occasions.
