

CHARLES BAILEY BOUCHER was the only son of Mr. and Mrs. T. Boucher of Wiveliscombe, Somerset, where he was born on June 2, 1891.

He entered Sidney in September 1905 and left in December 1909. He was a member of the XI.

He passed the entrance examination for Sandhurst in the autumn of 1910 and obtained his commission in the York and Lancaster Regiment in 1912, being promoted Lieutenant in 1914.

At the battle of Hooe he was wounded while leading his men, but continued to lead them. Wounded again, in the foot, he managed to crawl back, and was having his wounds bandaged when he was killed by a fragment of shell (August 9, 1915).
