

JOHN HUTCHISON GULLILAND was the elder twin son of Mr. and Mrs. Colin C. Gulliland of Calcutta and Glenthorne, North Foreland, Broadstairs. He was born at Calcutta in December 1892.

He entered Sidney House in September 1906, and left in July 1911, having been a member of the XI and the XV. Going up to Caius College, Cambridge, he read medicine and had just taken his degree when war broke out.

A member of the Cambridge O.T.C. he joined the Public Schools Corps on the outbreak of war and was gazetted to the 11th Essex Regiment. He was promoted Captain in March 1915 and was wounded at Loos, coming back to England in October. Re-joining his regiment in the spring of 1916, he was promoted temporary Major, while acting as second in command.

At the time of his death from wounds on July 18, 1916, he had lately been attached to the Brigade Staff.

An officer wrote: "The men worshipped him, and his officers too. It was not only that he always marched instead of riding . . . and that he was always cheerful; perhaps it was, most of all, that nothing could make him lose his temper."
