

SEISYTH HUGH LLOYD was the second son of Colonel and Mrs. G. O. B. Lloyd of Four Oaks, Warwickshire, and Duffryn, Merioneth. He was born at Wrexham on June 3, 1898, and entered Oundle (Laxton House) in September 1912, leaving in December 1916. He was a school prefect and captain of the XV.

He joined the R.N.A.S. on February 4, 1917, and trained at the Crystal Palace, Sleaford, and other centres, ending at Dover in July, whence he crossed to Dunkirk on July 29, 1917, to join the 10th Squadron at Winnerzeele.

On August 14, 1917, he was one of an offensive patrol. He was flying a "Sopwith Triplane" and set out with three other machines. Whilst over the lines near Zillebeeke he was observed to leave the flight and turn westward. At this time heavy anti-aircraft fire was experienced and Lloyd was not seen again by any of the pilots of his Patrol.

His death was presumed to have occurred on that day.

He had the reputation of being a fine pilot.
