

NORMAN FELLOWES PRYNNE was the fifth son of Mr. and Mrs. G. H. Fellowes Prynne of Grange Road, Ealing. He was born in London on October 23, 1897, and came to Oundle in January 1913, after having been for two years on H.M.S. Conway with a view to joining the Royal Navy. Leaving school in July 1915 Prynne went up to Selwyn College, Cambridge, in the autumn of the same year. Joining the University O.T.C. he soon became a corporal in the Corps, and in January 1916 received a commission, being gazetted to the 3rd Devon Regiment. After training at Devonport he was attached to the 10th Battalion, and sailed for Salonika in November 1916.

He was reported "missing, believed killed," as from April 24-25, 1917, after the attack on the Petit Couronne redoubts, when the losses of his regiment were very heavy.

His Commanding Officer wrote: "... during the time he had been with us, he had shown himself to be possessed of very fine qualities and a high sense of duty. He is a great loss to all in this battalion, by whom he was much liked and respected."
