

COLIN TURNER YOUNG was the second son of Howard and Mabel Young of Highbury Park, London, and was born in London on January 25, 1891.

He entered Dryden House in September 1903, and left in April 1907. Prior to August 1914 he had passed all his solicitor's examinations, and taken the LL.B. degree at London University. He had been for six years in the Inns of Court O.T.C.

Volunteering for foreign service on August 4, 1914, he obtained his commission on September 5, 1914, and joined the 3rd Battalion of the West Riding Regiment. He went to France in December 1914, attached to the 2nd Battalion, and was appointed Bombing Officer. He was severely wounded at Hill 60 (April 25, 1915) after being ten hours on the hill, and after fighting in all the five craters.

Later (in 1916) he was appointed Bombing Instruction Officer to the 41st Division, and was promoted Captain in June 1916.

He volunteered again for the front, and went to France, attached to the 17th Welsh Regiment in July 1916. He fell leading an attack on 24 April 1917. He was buried in Fins Cemetery.
